



The Long Trip Home



The log cabin of Irish immigrants, Dennis and Bridget Hogan O'Rourke, once located on land in section 21, town of Mitchell, southwest of Parnell.

On October 6, 2021 SCHRC received a query through our website - It reads "We are trying to find any information such as wills, land purchases, baptismal records or anything else pertinent for the family of Dennis O'Rourke, born 1812, died 29 August, 1867. He is buried in St. Michael's cemetery in Parnell."

"I believe I am a descendant of Dennis and his youngest son Martin O'Rourke born in 1865. Dennis had 80 acres in two adjacent parcels in Mitchell Township, Sections 21 and 28. These appear in the 1875 county plat book. Can you help us? Signed Steve O'Rourke. Baldwin, WI."

Of course, we can help. As it turns out, the land that Dennis and Bridget Hogan owned is the land that my husband's family bought in 1886. Dean and I still own that very piece of land. The O'Rourkes visit was something of a homecoming.

As we approach the end of this calendar year, it is both timely and appropriate for us to recognize our accomplishments as an organization and determine how each of us can contribute to its progress and sustainability in the days ahead.

First, let us congratulate ourselves on what we have done in 2021. Most of would probably agree that 2020 was a year that most nonprofits would like to forget due to COVID, and how the pandemic adversely affected so many organizations worldwide in their ability to promote their mission and service to the public. We also were affected, but through the diligent efforts of our board, staff, volunteers, members, and supporters, the organization was able to make this year a rousing success! We resumed in-person programming. We held an impressive Annual Meeting that was attended by 127 individuals. We resumed our Annual History Symposium, Taproom History, Lincoln Seminar, Second Saturdays, and genealogy classes. We continued publishing books that profile various aspects of Sheboygan County and Wisconsin history. We continued to process collections, and acquire new collections. Members and supporters gave so generously to the Annual Campaign that it was one of the most memorable in recent history for the organization. The frosting on the cake is that we are constantly attracting new members! In fact, we have acquired 22 new members since October! So, let us recognize our accomplishments, celebrate our achievements, and give thanks for all that we attained in 2021!

Second, we cannot afford to pause, stall, or plateau in 2022. Momentum is on our side and we need to remain vigilant, supportive, and passionate about the Research Center going into the new year. With that in mind, I want to tell you about some objectives, goals and initiatives we are already working on.

The date for 2021 "Giving Tuesday" is November 30. We have set a goal of raising \$2,500 to go towards a new studio at the Research Center. This studio will allow us to reach new audiences through interviews, podcasts, and audio/visual programs that we can promote on the website,

social media pages, and YouTube. A well-equipped studio will cost nearly \$5,000, but we are going after half that amount. Please mark your calendar for that date and give what you can to make the studio become a reality.

We will also be hosting a new "History on the Move" series at Chris & Sue's Place, W3820 CTH C, Plymouth, starting Thursday, January 20, 6:30 pm. They will be hosting the series January through April. We are looking for an individual or business to sponsor the series. Please consider promoting the Research Center by hosting this wonderful series of history programs.

The organization also has plans for a huge holiday event to be held Christmas 2022. We have a full year to prepare, and *the organization needs 100 artificial Christmas trees!* We are looking for large, medium, and small-sized trees. We can use 2' trees, 4' trees, 6' foot trees, 12' trees – ANY SIZE TREES! Do you know of any trees that people will be wanting to donate? Acquisitions continue to come in and the need to organize and process documents, maps, photographs, and other printed materials is always there. Dr. Laura Gellott, former Professor of History at UW-Parkside in Kenosha, spoke to a large Second Saturdays audience on November 13. Her presentation, "Helen Perry Curtis and the European Trip of a Lifetime," was based on her new book by the same title.

It was a visual biography of Curtis, combined with a virtual tour of Eastern Europe in 1937 based on Curtis's travels.

The O'Rourkes came from the townland of Marley, Parish of St. Mullins, County Carlow, Ireland located in the far south of the county just east of the Kilkenny border. After much research family members found marriage and baptismal records verifying the origins of the Wisconsin/Mitchell O'Rourkes.

Brothers, Michael & Dennis O'Rourke, immigrated together to Syracuse, NY in 1836, but were in Mitchell/Lyndon, Wisconsin by 1848. Another brother, Patrick, settled in Milwaukee.

The Dennis O'Rourke story is a bit of a tragedy. Dennis died in 1867 and his wife, Bridget Hogan O'Rourke, died shortly after in 1870 leaving five minor children. At age 20, son Dennis was responsible for them. Daughter Eliza was out of the house and married, and two infant sons lay in the family grave at St. Michaels with their parents.

Martin, the youngest child of Dennis and Bridget, was just two when his father died and five when his mother passed away.

A difficult life for all, the minor children were taken in by others. Martin ended up in Milwaukee where he went to school and then worked as a businessman.

Martin, who went by the name James Martin, married and had two children, George and James Glendon with his first wife. James Glendon is Steve's grandfather.

Martin's life was a bit of a mystery for decades. And this is how the connections to the O'Rourke family history were lost. Long story short, Martin changed his name to James Harris and made a new life for himself. Happily family members saved written letters and information that explained some of the mystery.

After much research, Martin's story was sorted out through a combination of great detective work, persistence by family members, DNA testing and a wise email sent to the Sheboygan County Historical Research Center.

It's been a privilege to work with Steve and Laurel. We're glad we were able to provide a piece of the puzzle for the family.







An aerial view of the land that Dennis and Bridget O'Rourke once owned in sections 21 and 28 in the town of Mitchell, Sheboygan County.






