

Cole Historic District Sheboygan Falls

Bounded by Water, Adams, Michigan and Monroe Streets, the area is one of the few remaining historic districts in the state to display the early development of a Wisconsin community of the 1830s and 1840s. The district's two residences, mill house and hotel were all built between 1837 and 1848 in the **Greek Revival Style.** This area was first known as Rochester. After construction of the bridge crossing the

bridge crossing the Sheboygan River in 1839, the area declined and Sheboygan Falls developed on the west side of the river.

Did You Know?

Have you ever wondered how neighborhoods or new subdivisions were named? Some monikers are obvious. Sheboygan has North Point named for the limestone ridge running east into the lake. Plymouth has Airpark named for Chaplin's airfield and its one remaining hangar.

Then there is Sheboygan's Driving Park addition. Taking up roughly the land between Weimann and Twentieth Streets and Saemann and Geele Avenues, it was home to one of Sheboygan's more curious recreation venues, the Gentlemen's Driving Park.

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The Sheboygan County Historical Research Center is located at 518 Water Street in Sheboygan Falls.

Lost Places

Mulleton, also known as Bunces' Corners, was a neighborhood community located at the confluence of the towns of Plymouth, Lyndon, Sheboygan Falls and Lima, today situated where Sumac Road bisects Highway 57.

A crossroads community, it began early, 1850, with Captain Alonzo Beals, a Great Lakes freighter captain, who after retirement settled there. A man of action, Beals thought Cascade too distant to participate in Methodist services, so he hewed the timber and assisted building a school/church. Initially, the congregation grew quickly, and a new frame meeting place was built, but the community began to falter within a couple of decades. The tiny church had but one wedding from 1883 to 1942.

Closed in 1961, the building was bought by the Cascade United Brethren Church and moved in 1962 to become the west wing of their structure.



"LET'S DEVELOP OUR CENTER"

In the October newsletter, I mentioned that the Center was hosting a new event we are calling a "Treemendous Celebration," that will take place at the SCHRC buildings November 25 – December 30, Tuesdays-Saturdays, 4:00 pm – 9:00 pm.

The event will feature dozens of Christmas trees, which have been sponsored by numerous organizations, businesses, and individuals. In addition to the trees, people will have an opportunity to tour the historic Mill House building, which houses the Research Center and is the oldest structure in Sheboygan County.

This six-week celebration is a major fundraising event for the Center. It is being made available free to the public due to the generosity of organizations and individuals who are sponsoring trees and the event. As of this writing, there are nearly 20 event sponsors and 50 tree sponsors. The goal is to raise \$20,000 for the Center, so all monies raised are crucial to the overall financial sustainability of the organization. Last January – just after Christmas 2021 ended – we began collecting the artificial trees you will see in our buildings. They came from Racine, Milwaukee, Oostburg, Port Washington, and communities throughout Sheboygan County. The SCHRC staff members were busy for several weeks picking up trees and transporting back to the Center for inventory. Some came in bags; some came in boxes; some were stranding in their stands inside homes; some were in many pieces. Then came the job of identifying the height of each tree. Many had to be reassembled. Then came the process of making sure

lights worked on each tree. Then came the task of making sure each tree had a reliable stand. By June, we had a working committee of numerous volunteers, who have been putting in many hours each week to make this event the best it can possibly be.

I also wish to thank committee members Ken Richter, Dean and Beth Dippel, Katie Reilly, Marge Giesen, Carole Wagner, Mary & Jarret Parrish, Holly Wartke, Val Vansickle, Lorrie & Jerry Wilson, Jackie Fritsch and others who have so generously given their time, energy, and passion to this year's *Treemendous Celebration*. The success of this event lays at the feet of this extraordinary group of people, who have surpassed all expectations and produced a truly memorable experience for the citizens of Sheboygan Falls and all of Sheboygan County!

2022 SCHRC Annual Meeting

The Milwaukee Sentinel dated August 5, 1888, reported the following: "Sheboygan has a new driving and exposition park. After many long efforts, the initiators have succeeded in interesting citizens in securing for the county a park somewhat in correspondence with the city's commercial importance and have purchased and completely equipped grounds just northwest of the city limits which in general excellence are unsurpassed in the Northwest. Twenty acres, carefully graded and enclosed, contain a half-mile oblong racecourse, 80 feet in width, an Exposition building, 26 feet high, 154 feet in length and 55 in width; a grandstand 150x20 feet, with a seating capacity of 1,000, and accommodations for sixty stock sheds. The driving park has two handsome entrances at the northeast and southwest corners, the latter being a terminus of the street railway."

There were such grand plans for the sport of kings in Sheboygan. All during the mid-to-late 1890s driving clubs were formed, and matinee or amateur sulky racing was introduced not only in big cities but also in many small towns. Horse racing competition was everywhere.

The horse industry was important economically in every town. There were blacksmiths, wheelwrights, breeders, auctioneers, veterinarians, carriage builders, carriage painters, express men, teamsters, draymen, harness and saddle makers, and more. All depended upon horses, so racing was a big deal.

In March of 1893, the Franey brothers, Tom and John, leased the Driving Park for a period of two years. They intended to fix up the track, use it for training horses and for racing bicycles. They also planned to fix up the exposition hall which for several years had remained unused and was in poor condition. Experts in everything horse, the course was successful for a handful of years under the Franeys.


Sheboygan's Gentlemen's Driving Club was founded in 1899 with many local businessmen owning pacers and trotters. The start of the club gave a big boost to racing. Their annual Derby Day began with a massive parade where all drivers and riders displayed their colors. Over 3000 people attended the first gala. City streetcars ran the hordes of people to and from the Driving Park. In 1902, the races had 70 entrants. Other race clubs attended, coming from Manitowoc, Green Bay, Appleton and Fond du Lac.

The club lasted just five years, disbanding about 1904 as the automobile took over the interests of those with disposable income. It seems it was too costly to maintain two such luxuries and horse racing in the city wheezed to an end.


For years after, the land sat dormant, occasionally hosting baseball games and picnics. The last accounts of the land show that it became part of the Driving Park addition to the city of Sheboygan with lot sales beginning in May of 1921.

By the end of the 1920s, aside from a few peddlers, milk trucks and fire wagons, the horse vanished and with it a way of life. The Driving Park remains only as a memory and the name of an addition to the city of Sheboygan.

1902 plat map showing the location of Driving Park











To the Hills and Lakes by Peter J. Fetterer
