A stop—motion TV special was created in 1964 and first shown on NBC. It was recorded in Japan apart from the soundtrack and voices which came from Canada.




Fun with Toys

In 1887 Sheboygan's most important and well–known manufacturer of toys for children, The Garton Toy Company, was formed. Toys produced by Garton Toy were rugged and dependable of good design and quality with grown–up realism. The result was a line of wheeled products unrivaled for superior performance, durability, and safety.

Eusebius Bassingdale (E.B.) Garton was born August 16, 1841, to English parents on a farm north of Toronto, Canada. As a young man of 23, he came to Sheboygan Falls, Wisconsin. His first job was driving an ox team for the sawmill of Joseph Richardson (later Richardson Brothers). He then worked for J.J. Zufelt manufacturing hubs on a contract basis until 1873, when he accepted the job of foreman in a department of the Sheboygan Mfg., Company. In July of 1878, E.B. left the company taking a similar position at the Sheboygan Carriage Factory.

In 1873, Messrs. Timler, Geisler, Venneberg and Kreger opened a planing mill. They put up a two–story, 30x50–foot building on the north bank of the Sheboygan River near the 8th Street Bridge. J. Dengel bought out the

firm in 1875 and began making cigar boxes in addition to custom work that included washboards and fish boxes.

E.B. left the carriage factory and partnered with James Logan. They bought Dengel's planing mill and cigar box factory in 1879. In 1880, Logan sold his interest to Griffith & Walters. Walters sold his interest in the business in 1881. In July 1887, a stock company was formed by E.B. Garton (Senior Partner), Mrs. A.C. Griffith, James Shufflebotham, Jr., John Mogenson, William Zimmermann, and C.C. Landenberger under the name of Garton Toy Company. E.B. acted as the firm's president until his death in 1931. The company manufactured sleds, tricycles, wheelbarrows, coaster wagons, scooters, doll buggies and strollers, croquet sets, and peddle cars for children. In the 1920s, the Garton one-piece metal coaster wagon was added to the Garton line. The red paint used on the wagon was simply known within the trade as "Garton Red."

At 4:30 am on December 5, 1891, fire was discovered in the Garton Toy Factory. It was suspected that sparks from the neighboring Halsted Furniture Factory smokestack had started the blaze. Garton Toy Company burned to the ground, a total loss. However, after the fire, E.B. built a larger factory on North Water Street and Niagara Avenue.

In 1929, a fire once again destroyed the Garton Toy Company. Following this fire, the 87–year–old E.B. Garton moved operations across the street into vacant buildings formerly occupied by American Hide and Leather. The company operated from this location until 1962 when it built a new facility on County Road LS, four miles north of Sheboygan. Eusebius Garton died in 1931, leaving control of the company to his son, Clarence E. Garton.

Pedal cars began to appear in the 1890s at about the same time as the first automobiles. No definite inventor has been identified, but it is thought that Garton Toy Company was the first American pedal car maker. Garton Toy continued to make pedal cars, aka "Kiddie Kars," into the 1930s, and the company became known as "the largest juvenile

vehicle plant in the world." The pedal car's popularity sharply increased between the World Wars and reached its peak in the 1920s and 1930s. The production of

pedal cars and other wheeled goods was totally suspended in the 1940s due to World War II. After the war, pedal cars experienced a massive post war boom. Families became wealthier, and goods became cheaper, so more people could afford them. Pedal cars became a regular item in the Sears Catalog as well as being advertised in magazines such as Life and Look, and sold in toy stores worldwide. The company introduced several new toy products in the 1960s that included the Casey Jones Locomotive, the Air Force Jeep, the Tin Lizzy, and the Spin–A–Roo to their inventory. Garton expanded its line in

1969 introducing injection molded plastic body autos mounted on a sturdy steel chassis such as the Sprite and GT models.

Without a doubt the largest, sleekest, shiniest, most popular, and distinctive toy in company history was the 1950 Garton Kidillac. Its design was based on the 1950 General Motors Cadillac. William L. Mitchell came up with a design for the Kidillac. Mitchell was an industrial designer and artist. At the age of 24, he was recruited by Harley Earl, the head of the General Motors' Art and Color Section, to lead the Cadillac Studio. He built a full–sized plaster model of his design and presented it to the Gartons' at their summer homes in Elkhart Lake, that they fondly called "Toyland." Mitchell had already done some styling for General Motors before he came up with the Kidillac design. He eventually became a vice president at GM. General Motors, the Cadillac parent, approved Garton

Toy's production of the Kidillac.
The cars became promotional components in Cadillac showrooms throughout the country. Schools

used pedal cars to teach children driving skills. Mitchell's inspiration, guidance and talent were responsible for the design of automotive legends such as the Corvette Sting Ray, Buick Riviera, Oldsmobile Toronado, Chevrolet Camero, and the Pontiac Firebird.

The Kidillac's catchy name and showy two-tone paint scheme added to its appeal. It was advertised

as having "a streamlined design, built low for ease of propulsion . . . made of one—piece steel, no seams or joints to come apart." Deluxe Kidillac models had electric horns, working headlights and taillights, and a highly desirable continental spare tire kit. Garton Kidillac's are highly prized and sought out by collectors today. In 1953, Garton Toy introduced the "Space Cruiser," and in 1956 they introduced the

Official Jack Webb "Dragnet Radio Car" based upon the popular police crime and drama series starring Jack Webb. It featured a working microphone and loudspeaker. Kidillac prices in 1953 ranged from \$30 to \$60. In 2023 dollars that comes to \$375 to \$750. Production of the basic and deluxe Kidillac line continued until 1963.

The Garton Family owned and operated the business for four generations. However, in 1973 due to decreasing profit margins, a declining market,


increased governmental and stricter consumer protection regulations, the Garton Toy Company was sold to the Monitor Corporation. The Garton Riverside Toy Factory on Water Street in Sheboygan changed owners several times. Gorman & Company, Inc., finally purchased the property in 1999. They renovated the old factory, converting it into the Garton Toy Factory Apartments. The building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2000. Today

the former Garton Toy plant north of Sheboygan on County Road LS is home of the Kohler Generator Plant.




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
