Let's Develop Our Center

So much of what occurs and is accomplished at the Center is the result of a large core group of volunteers, who very generously devote hours every week to their work. Some work on maps, photographs, and other images; others work on documents, obituaries and wedding announcements. Some process new collections that continually arrive, others labor on existing collections. A few individuals work on special assignments or scanning projects that bring in valuable revenue to the organization.

As we look to enhance our volunteer base — while honoring those persons who already give time and energy because of their passion for regional history — the SCHRC is making 2024 the “Year of the Volunteer.” We will be profiling current volunteers in our newsletter, recruiting new volunteers, and looking for new and fun opportunities that volunteers can participate in. I encourage all of our members and



supporters to consider volunteering at the Center. Volunteers make their own hours and set their own schedules. Our staff provides training and will assist you to identify tasks and assignments that suit you. Are you, or someone you know, looking for volunteer opportunities? We have them! Pay us a visit and see what is going on in the library. I hope we will hear from you soon!

I am very happy to report that the Center is close to completing a comprehensive upgrade to its multimedia collections. With financial assistance from William Collins Kohler Foundation, Kohler Foundation, Gentine Foundation, and private donors, the Center raised \$23,586, which allowed the Center to digitize 167 VHS video tapes and DVDs, 256 audio cassette tapes, and several reel-to-reel films. This extensive audio/video collection is now available to researchers online at <https://bit.ly/3U0U5NS>. Moreover, the Center has purchased a FOREVER® online account, which stores our existing multimedia collections, but also has sufficient capacity for adding more visual materials.

The Center also reached its goal of raising \$6,000 on Giving Tuesday last November 28! With matching funds supplied by SCHRC Board Vice-President Scott Peschke and another board member, the

Center raised over \$8,000! The funds will be used to furnish an entire room in the Adams Street building with industrial shelving to store collections. Thanks to all of our supporters who made this important project possible!

The new Book Club met last month. Nearly 20 persons have joined and met to discuss Robert Klara’s fascinating study, *FDR’s Funeral Train: A Betrayed Widow, A Soviet Spy, and a Presidency in the Balance*. The size of the group necessitated relocating from the Center to the Sheboygan Falls Memorial Library. The next book will be *The Presidents Club: Inside the World’s Most Exclusive Fraternity* by Nancy Gibbs and Michael Duffy. We will meet on Thursday, March 21, at the Sheboygan Falls Memorial Library from 1 to 2:30. Participants are responsible for obtaining their own books. 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However, Hopeman Implement elected to drop the Deere franchise agreement in 1951 and picked up a franchise agreement with the Ferguson Company in 1952. Ferguson was in the tractor business also and Hopeman Implement felt that there was a niche market for the tractor Ferguson was manufacturing. The Ferguson model 30 tractor was smaller than most of the larger tractors and operated similar to the way a truck functions. The use of horses to pull the various farm implements was coming to a close and the Ferguson model 30 filled the need left by the horses.

The Ferguson Company had set up a program for the Implement dealers to use called "The Ferguson Family Jubilee Program." This program subsidized the implement dealers costs and provided professional entertainers for the Farmer's Day events. January 24, 1952, was the special Farmers Day Event that Hopeman Implement elected to use to attract the farmers of Sheboygan County. Two programs were scheduled for the day, one at 1 pm and a second program at 8 pm, with a free lunch at Noon and another after the evening show.

The Ferguson Family Jubilee program included professional entertainers the Arkansas Woodchopper, Ray Klein, and Mary Jane from the Chicago Radio Station WLS, plus three educational color movies and entertainment by John Federwisch before and after each show. The Hingham community hall was filled for each of these performances.

I attended the afternoon program with my grade school classmates and was very impressed with the thought that these entertainers came all the way from Chicago to the little town of Hingham to put on a show for us. We had a family TV in 1952, but I never imagined that I would be in an audience of about 400 people in the local town hall with live performers.

The Hopeman Implement Company had a very successful year of selling the Ferguson tractors in 1952. In fact, it was so successful that Jess Hopeman, owner of Hopeman Implement, Inc., scheduled a similar event for 1953. However, in 1953 Jess Hopeman sent out an invitation to those farmers who had purchased a Ferguson tractor asking them if they drove their new tractor to the 1953 Farmer's Day event in Hingham, they would be offered a \$10.00 credit toward any purchase from Hopeman Implement. The incentive was very well received and almost 30 farmers showed up with their new Ferguson tractors. They were parked everywhere around the implement dealer, the community hall, and across the street next to the grocery store.

The 1953 Farmers Day event was similar to the 1952 show with a free meal, movies about the equipment sold by Hopeman Implement, and the professional performers from radio station WLS to round off the event.

In late 1953 and 1954, the Hingham Community Hall was remodeled. The wing on the southwest corner of the Hall was removed and a basement was installed with a full kitchen, new restrooms and shower facilities for use after sporting events.

Unfortunately, there was no facility in Hingham during this remodeling period and the next Farmers Day Event was rescheduled for January 1955. This happened to be the 50th anniversary year for the

Hopeman Implement dealership and the thirtieth anniversary under the leadership of Jess Hopeman. Again, it was a big event. Lulu Belle and Scotty, from WLS, Chicago, were on hand to entertain 450 people gathered in the Hingham Hall after a free meal and handouts.

Nineteen fifty-five may have been the last year for the Hopeman Implement dealership sponsorship of Farmers Day in Hingham, Wisconsin. However, the Hingham Feed Mill, joined up with Purnia Company to sponsor mid-winter events and for a few years in the fifties giving Hingham two farmer appreciation events during the winter months. 🍀

Sheboygan's First Bicycle Livery

The photograph below, taken in 1898, is of the S.A. (Steven A.) Tiftt & Company Bicycle Livery located at 617 N. 8th Street in Sheboygan. The building was erected about 1860 and would later become the location for Citizens State Bank. Tiftt formed a partnership with Harry Pepper and claimed his bicycle livery to be the first in Sheboygan. Tiftt sold a bicycle named the "Yellow Fellow" made by E.C. Stearns and Company of Syracuse, New York. The bicycle came in a basic roadster model for \$40 (\$1,500 in 2023) and a racer version that sold for \$60 (\$2,300 in 2023). They were advertised as "light, stylist, staunch and speedy mounts."

Edward C. Stearns transformed his father's hardware and wagon factory into a bicycle factory. Stearns was an excellent bike rider and opened his business in 1888. He watched it grow into four plants in Syracuse with 3,500 employees. Later, Stearns would have plants in Toronto, Canada, and Germany. At one time, Stearns was the largest maker of bicycles in the world. The "Yellow Fellow" has its own newspaper, published by Stearns, and was the subject of much

advertising and many racing competitions. In 1899, Stearns became part of American Bicycle Company.

Steven A. Tiftt was born on January 13, 1858, in Tomah, Wisconsin. He married Harriet DeSotal of Ludington, Michigan on September 25, 1881. The couple resided in Ludington until they moved to Sheboygan in 1898 where S.A. opened his bicycle livery.

In 1907, Tiftt left the livery and operated a restaurant and billiard hall in the basement of Schlicht Brothers (saloon and pool rooms, wholesalers in cigars, wines, and liquors) at 618 N. 8th Street. He was poultry manager at Pinehurst Farm for four years but retired because of ill health. S.A. Tiftt died at his home on March 20, 1930, after an illness of three months. Harriet died May 24, 1909, after a four-year battle with cancer. The couple had two children, Mrs. Jacob (Agnes M. Tiftt) Kampman and Mrs. Herman (Hazel K. Tiftt) Steinhaus. 🍀

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
DNA 101: A Seminar for Beginners with Dana Kelly
